

- Defence ministries of Japan, South Korea and the US plan to start a real-time datasharing system that will track North Korea's missile tests.



The International Baccalaureate (IB) program is renowned for its holistic approach to education, aiming to develop inquiring, knowledgeable, and caring young minds. 
